Raffle proceeds will benefit "She Plants a Seed for the Future" Torah Fund Special Project Susan was born in Orange, New Jersey; her family belonged to the only synagogue in the town. She often walked a mile by herself to attend Hebrew school; she and her sister were the only Jewish students in her public school. "I liked going to Hebrew school and services very much. I had an excellent education in Hebrew reading, speaking, prayers, holiday and customs," she said. She completed Hebrew school but chose not to have a Bat Mitzvah. "I was way too shy to even think about performing solo or in a small group," she said.

Susan graduated from Douglass College, Rutgers University, in New Jersey with a degree in Chemistry, Foods and Nutrition. Three weeks after graduation, she married her college sweetheart, Steven Goodman, a student at Rutgers. Their two sons attended Hebrew school and were Bar Mitzvah. The family took part in a special Bar Mitzvah ceremony on Masada; each family was given an Aliyah. She remembers her older son urging her to take the Aliyah because she was never going to have another opportunity, given she was a woman. It is 32 years later and on WL Shabbat, Susan read from the Torah and was honored with the Levy Aliyah.

In her professional life, Susan earned a Masters in Nutrition Education and worked as a Registered Dietitian and Certified Diabetes Educator. She taught college courses in foods and nutrition; served as a faculty member of a Family Medicine residency program; and taught Home Health Aides about foods and nutrition as part of their certification. For several years, Susan volunteered with the Consortium of Multiple Sclerosis Centers (CMSC), writing articles and providing nutrition information on their web site.

Susan has supported Torah Fund for many years. Last fall she visited The Jewish Theological Seminary, attending a lunch and learn in the Sukkah, followed by a tour led by Rabbi Lilly Kaufman, Executive Director of Torah Fund. "It was a very moving and spiritual experience," she said.

Despite Susan's quiet demeanor, she is a powerhouse of information, resources and experience. More essential, Susan is caring and compassionate, gentle and sincere in all she does. We, Women's League of Sutton Place Synagogue, applaud our honoree Susan Goodman and gently advise her to be comfortable with our accolades.

**Susan Goodman's** goodness and graciousness shine on the people, projects, and pursuits she undertakes. Her quiet strengths and ideals, creativity and compassion, have strengthened Sutton Place Synagogue and its Women's League. Upon joining SPS with her husband Steven 20 years ago, she initially served as a Shabbat greeter and usher in the Sanctuary. Soon her participation grew; she became co-president of WL. During her high school years, she volunteered at an afternoon program that had activities for physically challenged children. Then, for two summers, Linda worked at a sleep-away camp for severely handicapped children and young adults. She assisted those people with their activities of daily living, which gave her terrific experience and the perfect lead-in to her 30-year career as a physical therapist, earning her B.S. in PT at Sargent College at Boston University. She worked at the Orthopedic Institute at Hospital for Joint Diseases in NYC. These days, Linda can often be seen assisting many of our elderly Habonim members when they attend Shabbat services and need help to sit, stand, or navigate with their walkers.

Her parents were refugees from Nazi Germany, having come to this country with very limited resources. They were among the first members of the newly formed Congregation Habonim. Florence's parents were regular synagogue attendees and her mother, especially, was very active in synagogue life. Florence was not a regular synagogue goer while growing up, but after she had children, Florence became active in synagogue life in New Jersey; attending services regularly, serving on the synagogue board and on numerous committees. Since she is a part-time New Yorker, Florence and her husband belong to two Conservative synagogues - Or Olam in New York City and B'nai Israel in New Jersey. Florence and Bill attend services fairly regularly and Florence serves on the Adult Education Committee in New Jersey and she is active in Women's League at Or Olam. At least once a year, Florence leads the book club, an activity which she finds to be very enjoyable. For the last several years, Florence has attended courses at the Women's League Institute at the Jewish Theological Seminary, which she finds stimulating and thought-provoking.
